

Form a team at your school, create a climate action video and be in to win!

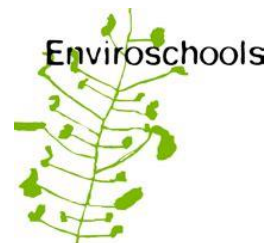


The climate crisis is scary, but there are a lot of people in Te Tai Tokerau taking action. Your videos will help other young people see cool projects happening now.

Prize categories

Here are the judging criteria. These criteria account for 75%, with another 25% allocated for production values. The winning team in each category will get \$1,000 and the runner up, \$500.

Best story: Your video is inspiring and clearly shows how people in Tai Tokerau are working to mitigate and adapt to climate change.

Te Reo: Your video skillfully includes Te Reo and tells an inspiring story.

Best engagement: Your video has the highest number of views on the specified social media platforms.

Some examples

Chinampas

Hamish Clueard is developing chinampas in the wetland on whanau land at Tutukaka. This will slow water down, recharge the aquifer and protect the harbour.



Electric vehicles

Joe Camuso and Russell Watson have been tirelessly promoting EVs with Northland having one of the highest adoption rates in Aotearoa.

Solar Farms

Tū Mai Rā Energy is installing a solar farm at Tau Henare Marae in Pīpiwai. This will further reduce our dependence on fossil fuels and provide cheaper electricity for locals.



Regenerative agriculture

Tracy Ody is growing diverse pastures on her Whangarei Heads farm, putting more carbon in the soil and improving animal health.

Kelp Regeneration

Glenn Edney is leading the Hauora Moana project at Tutukaka. Regenerating kelp will massively increase carbon sequestration and regenerate marine ecosystems.



Predator Free Aotearoa

Eliminating pests will increase the capacity of forests to drawdown carbon and coll the environment. The Kiwi Coast Project has helped eliminate 492,458 pests over the last 8 years.
